I have been called "My Poor Little Lake" by my people, but I am really not little (though in the shadow of the Great Lakes I am less than great). I am split in two by a major highway and widely varying approaches to cure my ills. Although my northwest and southeast sides are roughly similar in size and share many problems, they are very very different. A famous Institute lives on my shore. I am closer to Ohio than to most of New York, and I eventually flow into the Mississippi River. Who Am I?

Answer 3- Glenn:

I am more famous than large, and many movies show at least part of me while filming scenes on my shore. I am surrounded by many many observers, flesh and steel. My name is pretty dull, so I am green with envy and HABs for many many months every year. I am fed a steady diet of water not used by my thirsty neighbors, but I wonder if the nutritional supplements they give me are making me ill. Although I am only about 20 acres big, I sometimes hold more than 100 rowboats and watch many joggers, walkers and wedding parties. Who Am 1?



First Segment- Who Drinks My Water?

Answer 1- George:

I am the Alcove Reservoir, a 1400 acre lake fed primarily by Hannacroix Creek. I was born around 100 years ago, and provide about a 600 day supply of water when full. When needed, I get some help from Basic Creek Reservoir to Capitolize on our abundant supply of water. I am more than 10 miles away from nearly 100,000 residents and many civil servants who drink my water. Given my location, I get a lot of attention from regulators. Who Drinks My Water?



First Segment- Who Drinks My Water?

Answer 2- Glenn:

I am Canadice Lake and Hemlock Lake, two of the smaller Finger Lakes. Unlike many surface drinking water supplies, I do not allow power boats or swimming, but I have been able to quench the thirst of my people in a very large city since the late 1800s. Most of my people live about 30 miles away- more than 200,000 residents and businesses. My waters are treated and stored in three reservoirs- Rush Reservoir, Cobbs Hill Reservoir and Highland Park Reservoir. Who Drinks My Water?



First Segment- Who Drinks My Water?

Answer 3- Fred:

I am Loughberry Lake, a very small reservoir just northeast of my city. Although I live very near some famous mineral springs and a very very large namesake lake, I (along with some springs) have been supplying drinking water to about 30,000 people, and presumably some horses and NEAPMSers, starting in the 1870s. While there have been many studies looking at other places to quench the thirst of this thriving community, I have served my community well. Who Drinks My Water?



First Segment- Which AIS Am I?

Answer 1- Glenn:

I was first observed in New York state and North America around the same time- the 1870s. I was brought to New York by a Catholic priest, perhaps the reason for the common name "Jesuit's nut" once used to describe me. I can be identified by a floating rosetta of triangular serrated leaves, feathered leaves below the surface, and especially a four pronged seed with barbed spines. I share a common name with an unrelated edible tuber common in Chinese cuisine. Which AIS Am 1?

Answer 2- Fred:

I was first reported in New York state in 2008, but I can assure you I came here earlier than that, probably migrating from a nearby state. I have been documented in about 25 lakes in New York state, half of which were reported by this host and one of our esteemed panelists, but I have attracted far more attention than other similarly uncommon invasives. I am often mistaken for a very common waterweed, but I can be easily identified by many serrated whorls and a tuber. Which AIS Am I?

Answer 3- George:


Until recently, several New York botanists questioned whether I am actually invasive in New York, and the NYS Biological Surveys from the 1930s couldn't find me anywhere in the state. I was first reported growing in shallow water in Long Island, but later found in the 1990s in upstate New York in lush meadows under 20 feet of water in three lakes. I am commonly mistaken for similar native plants, but am more likely to have a petiole and I am usually found in slightly acidic water. My common name includes a state in which I may be native, and I am green or purple. Which AIS Am I?
