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It's 2004! PWC Training is Mandatory

As of January 1, 2004 all operators of personal watercraft, regardless of age, will be required to earn a safety certificate before they may operate.

A safety certificate may be obtained by completing the *New York Safe Boating Course*, sponsored by the Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation. Volunteer instructors throughout the state teach the course free of charge. Other providers may teach the personal watercraft course for a fee, however no fee may be charged to anyone under the age of eighteen. A course listing can be found on the web at www.nysparks.com/boats/yb/.



A certificate may also be obtained through the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary or U.S. Power Squadron. For information on these courses, call 1-800-336-BOAT.

According to the nysparks.com website, new volunteer instructors are

needed to teach the New York Safe Boating course. NYS Parks & Recreation will provide the textbooks, lesson plans, and audiovisual materials to volunteers. To become a State certified instructor, you must meet certain eligibility requirements. For more information, call (518)474-0445.





CSLAPpenings

Dear CSLAP Volunteers and Lake Association Officers,

It's once again time to forget about the cold, snow and wind and look forward to an early spring. Therefore, we are now planning the 2004 season of the Citizens Statewide Lake Assessment Program (CSLAP). Because we have equipment and supplies to order, bottles to preserve, labels to print, and baggies to fill, we need to know how many lakes will be joining us next year.

As in previous years, there will be a \$200.00 CSLAP participation fee to cover some of the program expenses. We have found these funds to be extremely valuable when state budgets are not passed until July, and the sampling season needs to begin! You should note that this \$200.00 does not even cover the shipping costs of the program. So we truly believe that CSLAP is still a great bargain.

We will again be relying on the services of Upstate Freshwater Institute (UFI) in Syracuse. We have our new postal permit in place, and we hope that all of you who used the United States Postal Service have a trouble-free season at last. We are also going to try to work out a few kinks with UPS to try to keep our shipping costs down. PLEASE DISCARD ANY OLD UPS OR MAILING LABELS ADDRESSED TO THE NYS DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND/OR UPSTATE FRESHWATER INSTITUTE ON VAN RENSSELAER STREET IN SYRACUSE.

The NYSFOLA office is now ready to accept your 2004 NYSFOLA dues and CSLAP fees. We would also like to know if your lake will NOT be participating and any reason *why* that may help us with planning future years. Please remember that the \$200.00 fee is PER SITE. If you have multiple sampling sites, you must cover the cost of each site.

We must have everything in place NO LATER THAN MARCH 15TH, 2003 in order to order and prepare equipment and to prevent conflicts with the NYSFOLA annual conference planning schedule.

For new lakes entering the program, or for anyone who wants a "refresher course," training will once again be held on Saturday May 1st as part of the NYSFOLA annual meeting and conference at White Eagle Conference Center in Hamilton.

Our sincerest thanks to all of our CSLAP volunteers who braved a cool and rainy 2003 sampling season. Some of you sampled well into the coolest days of October. Hence, the lab is just getting the final data package together to ship over to Scott so that he can start writing all **90** of the 2003 reports.

To the Editor....

I am writing to NYSFOLA partly out of frustration and partly because your organization represents many of the lake associations such as ours in the State of New York. I'm somewhat frustrated because I have been trying to contact Governor Pataki a number of times by letter to discuss the matter of Eurasian water milfoil and the devastation that it is causing in many of New York State lakes, including Augur Lake. I have had no success what-so-ever in reaching him, hence this letter to NYSFOLA.

As you probably know, the Augur Lake Property Owners Association (ALPOA) has been attempting to control the spread of this insidious weed with the use of triploid carp and, to date, have had reasonably good success. However the process that the Adirondack Park Agency (APA) put us through to use the carp was extremely expensive and time consuming, covering about one year's worth of paper work and other odds and ends. If additional fish were to be required somewhere down the road, the APA would require this entire process to be repeated. It appears that the APA takes a reactive role when it comes to the question of handling milfoil instead of a proactive role which could, at some point in time, eliminate the milfoil problem once and for all. I therefore felt the need to bring this entire question to the attention of the Governor. Apparently more ammunition is needed to get to his office.

In my letters to Governor Pataki, I have suggested that he appoint a Milfoil Task Force independent of other State Agencies to address the milfoil question and see if a model can be developed to control its spread, especially in the smaller lakes where available dollars are limited by small membership. At the present time, there appears to be no successful method of controlling this non-native weed with the possible exception of grass eating carp. To carry out new programs possibly using chemicals or weevils would require many additional dollars which could be made available by the State through this proposed task force. I am fully aware that there have been many seminars put on covering the question of invasive weeds, but in actuality, milfoil reduction, in my opinion, is only taking place on a very limited scale.

In my opinion, we need a State funded effort staffed with technical and lay people alike to take charge of this situation and to come up with factual and practical solutions as to how we can eliminate or at least control the spread of this menacing weed from many of our once beautiful New York State lakes.

Perhaps if this article were to appear in one of your publications it would also stir up some activity in looking to the State for some help. I would also hope that you would pass on your thoughts to the Governor about this very serious situation facing many of our lake front home owners in New York State.


